- D. Approval of the March 18, 2002 Minutes
The Executive Summary for March 18, 2002 was approved unanimously after a motion from Jonathan Jorissen.

II. REPORTS

- A. Student Senate Update
 - ♣ The Senate had an emergency meeting Sunday to discuss resolutions having to do with the new alcohol policy changes.
 - ♣ The Senate passed a resolution requiring a flowchart outlining the disciplinary procedures to be added to *duLac*. The resolution passed in CLC also.
 - ♣ The Senate also passed a letter concerning the "SYR" and its unfair removal from student life. The resolution failed by one vote in CLC.
 - ♣ There are four or five items on the agenda for next week. One of the items up for discussion is a resolution increasing the minimum allocation to the CCC from 36.75% to 40% of the student union budget.

 - ♣ Peter Rossmann announced that the Class of 2002 is already working on a similar project that will be an endowed annual event. The class council has already received \$50,000 from The Shirt Fund.
 - ♣ The Cabinet voted 8-0 to not approve the Pre-Med Society's Appeal while advising the Society to collaborate with the Class of 2002 to make the bone marrow drive a success.

 - ♣ Amy O'Connor presented the new format for the Collaboration Fund Appeal form.
 - ♣ Peggy suggested that the CCC address be included in the fine print. Peggy also asked if the forms will eventually be available online.
 - ♣ The Cabinet voted to unanimously approve the new sheet with the recommended change.
