Neuroscience and Behavior

Nancy Michael joined Notre Dame faculty five years ago, when students and South Bend community members will testify that she "hit the ground running." During her first year, Dr. Michael developed a neuroscience curriculum that incorporated community-based learning and the scientific data on brain development. In this course, students were designated translators of science, with a responsibility to teach and inform South Bend community members the reality of developmental neuroscience, the impact of early childhood development and the importance of parental and primary care. Five years later, Dr. Michael continues to gather students and community members together in a semester-long project which culminates in a teach-back session. This session occurs immediately before Christmas break, and promotes conversation about social justice, prejudice, early childhood development and parenting, in light of scientific data. Dr. Michael challenges her students to align their values and behaviors, invoking the pillars Catholic Social Teaching as principles that many Notre Dame affiliates uphold, but do not always act upon.

Dr. Michael's dedication to pedagogy is motivated by her genuine care for her students. Encouraging students to come to her outside of office hours, she listens with open ears and an open heart to the everyday concerns of her students. Her care for her students goes goes beyond expectations for an advisor or counselor. In all of my four years at Notre Dame, Dr. Michael remains the only professor to have looked me in the eyes and ask, "Are you ok?" As students, we are often made aware of the busy schedules of our professors, but Dr. Michael has never hesitated to take time for a student in need. Her diligent work, outstanding projects, and exemplary teaching are supplemented by her genuine personality and kindness towards all.

For the majority of her senior year, Kelli served as the editor-in-chief of The Observer — a thankless, but vital job. Each and every day, Kelli was motivated by one, deeply held belief: that the student body and the larger Notre Dame community is privy to far more information than they have, that it is The Observer's duty to report the truth and give it to the individuals that truth impacts the most — the students.
